My family has also traveled to NY to meet my half-siblings, aunts, uncles, and cousins. They have all made me feel very welcome.

Thank you Kinsolving for doing what many consider 'impossible'. Included is a poem that I wrote during the first emotional days of contact. It best sums up how I felt at that time. I wish everyone searching for lost family will have their own liberating experience someday soon. It is priceless!

During our many phone calls, not only have I gotten all the information I wanted about our mother, I now have two new siblings! They have shared photographs confirming incredible resemblances. I can't describe the feeling of seeing my mother (if only in a photo) for the first time at the age of 46.

Our newly forged relationships are permanent. Both my siblings will visit here this Spring to meet and become part of my family.

Above all, my new family has taken nothing away from my adopted family. As a result of my search, I am closer now than ever with my adopted brother and my adopted cousins. My adopted brother says he will be a future Kinsolving client.
